### From the President

South Australian farmers are facing one of the worst droughts in over a century, yet the crisis is barely registering beyond our borders. While the 2018-19 drought drew national attention, the current situation in SA and western Victoria has been overshadowed by floods in Queensland and fires in Victoria. With most of the state's productive farmland experiencing very much below average rainfall — and some areas recording the driest conditions in over 100 years — farmers are entering this season without subsoil moisture. Recovery will take time, even if rain returns soon. SADA is joining with PPSA and other commodity groups to meet with the Premier this week. We will continue advocating to ensure SA's dairy farmers get the recognition and support they deserve. Tough times are not new to our industry — and together, we will get through this.

ico presents both opportunities and risks for Australian dairy. Rising tariffs on US dairy exports to Mexico could create openings for Australian producers to enter this key market, where US products have traditionally dominated. Time to draw a line in the sand on farm safety.

The latest data released by AgriFutures Australia and collated by the team at Ag-Health Australia has revealed a sharp and deeply concerning rise in on-farm fatalities and serious injuries, with 72 lives lost and 133 serious injuries recorded in 2024. Farmsafe Australia, the national peak body for farm safety, is calling for urgent action, declaring that it is time to draw a line in the sand and make farm safety a nonnegotiable priority.

#### Farmers welcome national food plan commitment

The National Farmers' Federation (NFF) welcomes the Australian Government's commitment to a National Food Security Strategy, Feeding Australia – a key ask of the NFF in the lead-up to the election.

NFF President David Jochinke said the strategy was an important step in ensuring agriculture was all about safeguarding our farm sector and food supply in an increasingly volatile world.

"With the backing of members, we've long called for a national plan to safeguard Australia's food system, and we welcome this commitment from the Government," Mr Jochinke said.

"Australia is lucky to have a strong and resilient food system, but we're not bulletproof. Farmers are facing workforce shortages, skyrocketing costs, supply chain pressures, and increasing regulatory hurdles.

"Farmers rely heavily on imported fuel, fertiliser and chemicals to grow our crops, exposing us to global disruptions. As a nation, we can't afford to take our food security for granted.

"This strategy needs to deliver a clear framework to understand where our supply chains are vulnerable, and work strategically to address those vulnerabilities."

Mr Jochinke said the NFF is ready to work with the Government and stakeholders across the supply chain to ensure the strategy delivered real outcomes.

"Any plan about food security must include farmers from the get-go. We need to ensure that this isn't just another report, but a meaningful blueprint that supports the future of food production in Australia."

The NFF also welcomed the Government committing to examining the potential to grow a biofuels feedstock industry - another ask in the NFF's election platform to ensure a sustainable and consistent supply of raw materials.

"NFF members now call on all sides of politics to commit to a National Food Plan, one that protects farmers' supply chains," Mr Jochinke said.

"This isn't just an issue for farmers, but for every Australian who serves up Australian grown food at the dinner table."

## Rabobank Dairy prices

### to remain elevated despite modest global supply growth.

The global dairy market is poised for modest supply growth in 2025, driven by steady production expansion and export demand, according to a new report by food and agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank.

However, with the slow growth rate not expected to translate into surging stocks or general oversupply, global dairy prices look set to remain at elevated levels.

For Australia, the report says, dairy farm margins are poised to benefit from improving farmgate prices through 2025, high commodity returns and a softer currency.

In its Q1 Global Dairy Quarterly report, titled Modest growth amid trade shifts, Rabobank says it expects milk production in the Big 7 dairy-export regions (the EU, US, New Zealand, Australia, Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay) to expand by 0.8% year on year (YOY) for 2025, with a similar gain in the first half of 2026.

The report says this forecast is driven largely by a return to production growth in both the EU, where production has oscillated between growth and contraction in recent quarters, and the US, where the typical annual production gains of 1% have stagnated in recent years.

"US supply expansion is expected in 2025, but it's likely to be modest at sub-1%," report co-author, RaboResearch senior dairy analyst Michael Harvey said. "Production gains are also expected from Oceania and

South America, largely driven by prior year declines that are easy to surmount. Overall, we anticipate milk production from the 'Big 7' will reach 325.8 million metric tonnes (mt) in 2025, up from 323.2 million mt last year."

For Australia, the report says, despite milk production beginning to decline in late 2024, after seven months of the current season, overall production is 0.4% higher YOY.

Mr Harvey says production is weak in western Victoria and Tasmania, but remains strong in eastern and northern Victoria and in New South Wales. "The outlook for milk production heading into the seasonal spring peak this year – and for the 2025/26 season overall – will be heavily dependent on rainfall and weather conditions," he said.

RaboResearch forecasts overall Australian milk production growth of 0.7% YOY for the 2025/26 season.

Since selling the dairy farm Grant has reverted to his former career as a dairy vet. His Knowby platform brainchild was born from frustration with staff/ tasks and his inability to communicate accurately. The game changing platform allows the production of quick visual step-by-step instructions and is currently used across 30 different industries and 20 countries around the world.
